

A Carpenter And His Glasses

(Food for Thought)



My Mother's father worked as a carpenter. On this particular day, he was building some crates for the clothes his church was sending to orphanages in China.

On his way home, he reached into his shirt pocket to find his glasses, but they were gone. When he mentally replayed his earlier actions, he realized what had happened; the glasses had slipped out of his pocket unnoticed and fallen into one of the crates, which he had nailed shut.

His brand new glasses were heading for China!

The Great Depression was at its height and Grandpa had 6 children. He had spent \$20 for those glasses that very morning. He was upset by the thought of having to buy another pair. "It's not fair," he told God as he drove home in frustration "I've been very faithful in giving of my time and money to your work, and now this."

Months later, the director of the orphanage was on furlough in the United States. He wanted to visit all the churches that supported him in China, so he came to speak one Sunday at my grandfather's church in Chicago.

The missionary began by thanking the people for their faithfulness in supporting the orphanage. "But most of all," he said, "I must thank you for the glasses you sent last year. You see, the Communists had just swept through the orphanage, destroying everything, including my glasses. I was desperate. Even if I had the money, there was simply no way of replacing those glasses. Along with not being able to see well, I experienced headaches every day, so my coworkers and I were much in prayer about this."

"Then your crates arrived. When my staff removed the covers, they found a pair of glasses lying on top." The missionary paused long enough to let his words sink in. Then, still gripped with the wonder of it all, he continued: "Folks, when I tried on the glasses, it was as though they had been custom made just for me! I want to thank you for being a part of that."

The people listened, happy for the miraculous glasses. But the missionary surely must have confused their church with another, they thought. There were no glasses on their list of items to be sent overseas.

But sitting quietly in the back, with tears streaming down his face, an ordinary carpenter realized the Master Carpenter had used him in an extraordinary way.

There are times we want to blame God instead of thanking him!

FAMILY PROMISE/IHN By Marilyn McAfee

Another year has passed; where does the time go? Thanks to the many volunteers who served Family Promise guests in 2007 by



providing food, serving as dinner hosts and/or by spending the night sleeping on an air mattress in a church classroom. When serving as a dinner host you witness first hand the excitement of little children playing, the concern on the faces of the older children coping with daily issues and peer pressure (both home and school) and the adults who are trying to comfort and reassure their families as they work to find a safe, secure permanent home. You are there, not to judge, but to be a good listener and to provide understanding and comfort.

In January we did not take in families. The month of January is typically a slower time for all Emergency Shelters, and this was the case for Family Promise, as well. While evictions still occur, many landlords are less likely to evict in the cold winter months. If the property sits empty, they gain nothing. If a family lives in the property – even if they are behind on their rent – the landlord stands a better chance of recouping some of the lost income.

Another factor affecting emergency shelter use in the winter is income tax refunds. Today, an individual can take their last paycheck from 2007 into a tax/accounting agency, pay a fee, and receive an advance on their expected refund. This gives them a little money to work with, often delaying their impending homelessness.

Finally, when it is cold outside, extended family and friends tend to take a little better care of each other – especially when children are involved.

Good News - Updates on past families...former guest Josie Hughes has joined our Board of Trustees. Josie and her 5 children were in the program in the fall of 2007. They secured permanent housing after just 2 months, and Josie has enrolled in classes at Owens Community College. She is very appreciative of the support and encouragement she received while a guest in Family Promise and looks forward to being able to give back to the program through her volunteer activities on our Board.

A 2006 former guest, Antoinette, who had two beautiful little girls and was expecting a baby boy during her stay in Family Promise...Antoinette is working full time, taking classes at Owens, and was recently approved to purchase her own home. This is a great success story!

Last week, furniture from our storage unit was delivered to Michelle and her family who spent 90 days in our Network but needed additional time and entered an additional shelter. She finally achieved "success" (her words). Through Network Associates she has a full time job and was approved for NPI housing. She too was very appreciative for the support and encouragement she received while a guest in Family Promise.

Fairgreen will be hosting families on Monday, March 3, 2008 at Pilgrim Church. Currently we have three families. We have a single father and his daughter, two single mothers, one with three boys and the other with two.

Starting this year, a Volunteer Orientation program is being implemented. This has long been needed and will ease the concerns of all volunteers. The Orientation is happening every Sunday at the Host Church. Those scheduled to help during the week (Fairgreen on Monday, March 2) are asked to please participate in this informal orientation at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday at Pilgrim. Alina Fuller, LSW, will be on hand to talk with volunteers about what to expect during the week. She will review any special needs the current guest families have and answer your guestions. We are confident that this new

weekly meeting for volunteers will enhance guest/volunteer relationships and make for smooth sailing.

Last but not least, the little hands and fingers of second grade artists at Highland Elementary School again poured their hearts into making beautiful soup bowls for the **"Empty Bowls – Full Hearts"** fundraiser benefiting both Family Promise and the Agape Soup Kitchen. Not only did the second graders provide bowls, but also high school students. It was fun to watch these students with big smiles on their faces pour over the bowls and compare theirs with others. How proud, such pride! Great kids! This is the fourth year that Cindy Bandfield has chaired this wonderful outreach program. Cindy is one of our Fairgreen angels for whom Family Promise sings praises. The other is the kitchen wizard, Carol Yeager who made gallons and gallons of vegetable soup. There were others involved in this fundraiser too, but you are the ones we know so well who are always busy, giving and giving...and strangely it's the busiest people who accomplish the most! Thanks Cindy and Carol. God delivered the angels that caused people to dig deep into their pockets in support of these two missions. Family Promise is so grateful for your continued support.

In closing, a letter from Elizabeth Tore, Executive Director of Family Promise is included assuring each of us that steps are in place for screening our guests into the Network.

Dear Family Promise Volunteer:



Thank you for your commitment to helping families experiencing homelessness. I want to assure you that both our Licensed Social Worker and Executive Director have carefully screened every adult accepted into this program. The screening process includes a background check, mental health assessment, drug & alcohol screening, document verification, and more.


Every adult participates in a phone interview, and two or three face—to—face interviews prior to acceptance in the program. The only time an individual may enter with fewer interviews is when he or she is already working with a Licensed Social Worker who can verify the client's history and status.

These interviews are professional assessments based on extensive training and experience. We know what risk factors and warnings signs to watch for, and ask questions that are specific and purposeful, not just to gather general information but also to test for responses that may be of concern. Any adult who is a risk to the safety of other guests, volunteers or staff will not be accepted into the program.

We have all heard the adage "don't judge a book by its cover." Our guests – male or female – black or white – clean cut or rough around the edges – are all just people. They deserve respect and dignity as they go through this difficult time in their lives. This is truly the most important gift we can give.

Please trust our process and be assured that the safety of all involved – volunteers, staff and guests – is our highest priority.
