## *From The Pastor's Desk...*

Not really! As you know I am away on Sabbatical right now and I am sitting at a very different desk for the first part of my Sabbatical journey has taken me to the Dominican Retreat and Conference Center in Adrian, Michigan. While it is a blessing to be away from my everyday responsibilities I have found it hard to switch from the busyness of all of that, especially Lent and Easter, to this more relaxed and reflective pace. The primary question that I have had in front of me through this Sabbatical year actually comes from a Mary Oliver poem called The Summer Day. I have brought this question with me as I study, write, pray, reflect for I hear it as a question that God asks each us each and every day of our lives:

***"Tell me, what it is you plan to do  
with your one wild and precious life?"***

So I find myself sitting at a very different desk...

- writing my morning pages, my spiritual discipline of journaling at the beginning of each day;
- reflecting upon and taking notes from all that I have read the day before;
- and reading the works of Henri Nouwen (the Life of the Beloved, Sabbatical Journey, and Out of Solitude), James Finley (Merton's Palace of Nowhere), Joyce Rupp (God's Enduring Presence), and Delli Carpinie (Poetry as Prayer – Emily Dickinson).

When I get tired of reading I go to the bench by the pond where I sit and (after a walk through the fields and around the little marsh)...

- reflect on the wonderful creation we have been blessed with (the geese seem to be dancing on the water as they splash one another) as I journal or not;
- take pictures as I experiment with my new camera (how many turtle pictures do you think that one can take?) as I hope to one day make a collage of my photographs and the psalms that they remind me of;
- read the poetry of Mary Oliver (Why I Wake Early, Red Bird, Thirst, and New and Selected Poems, Volume Two), Margaret Atwood (The Door), Winston O Abbott (Have You Heard the Cricket Song) and David Whyte (River Flow). Mary Oliver writes all the time about paying attention as a form of prayer, I think that she is right. I am trying real hard to learn to pay attention, to be astonished and to then to tell others! I love to pray this way!

Of course, I spend time sitting in a very comfortable chair in the Dining Hall of this very beautiful center as well...

- where I eat (it is so nice not to have to worry about or prepare food when I am on a retreat!);
- and since I am on a silent retreat, I read Judith Valente's and Charles Reynard's book, *Twenty Poems to Nourish Your Soul*. This book has become my favorite with its poems organized around the ten themes rooted in Ignatian spirituality and has inspired me to find out more about St. Ignatius and his understanding of the Spiritual Disciplines especially the discipline of praise (pray) which is the primary focus of my sabbatical studies.

And then there is the rocking chair at the end of the hall where I sit to ...

- watch the sun set each night where I sit to read Frances Hodgson Burnet (*The Secret Garden*);
- work on my latest prayer shawl or
- just sit and pay attention!

Yes! My days are full but the pace is so different. It is a gift to be able to put aside my everyday responsibilities to simply renew, refresh and to study and I thank all of you for making this possible. You will hear lots more about my Sabbatical time when I return for these first 6 days have been preparation for the next ten days – our trip to the Holy Land.

Please keep myself and all of the others pilgrims in your prayers – Linda Hoover, Gina Beauregard, Dick Schroeder, Pat and Chuck Gibson and the other 42 people who will travel with us. Pray that our hearts and minds will be open to all that God will gift us with as we go to walk where Jesus walked. As it says in Psalm 84, a prayer of a pilgrim to Jerusalem...

*"Happy are those who dwell in your house!  
They never cease to praise you.  
Happy are those who find refuge in you,  
whose hearts are set on pilgrim roads."*

My heart has been set on a pilgrim road as I have walked into the first of my two three week Sabbatical sessions. I am excited about where all I will go – physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually! And I am excited about sharing the experience with you when I return (but I promise you that you will only have to look at 1 or 2 turtle pictures!). Our first time of sharing will take place during worship on Sunday, May 17<sup>th</sup> when the six of us will lead worship together. We will then do a Potluck supper at a date yet to be determined to share more of our journey with you. Once I return from the Holy Land I will take a few more days of silence at the Lial Retreat Center.

But for now, I hear the birds 'a calling so it must be time to go walk the labyrinth once more!

## A TEACHING MOMENT —THE SEASON OF EASTER!

It never ceases to amaze me when I walk into worship in another congregation and find the folks so sober faced that I have to think that no one has told them the Good News – **Jesus Christ has risen from the dead!** When this happens on the Sunday after Easter I am even more astonished!

It is as if the congregants are still waiting in that upper room for Jesus to show up not sure that the women have told them the truth – that Jesus would meet them there! There are no left over Easter lilies, no white paraments, no alleluias being sung! You can't find a smile on anyone's face! Now I know that we are called to be serious about our faith. I am! When we make the decision to invite God into our lives we are changed forever but I still wonder why so many of us walk around looking and acting like our best friend has just died? Yes! We can be just like the women at the tomb that first Easter – afraid and amazed! But that does not mean that we should live our lives as if we are in mourning. We are after all Easter People! **Jesus Christ has risen from the dead!** That is God's gift for us. That is the good news we celebrate all the time, especially during **the season of Easter.**

**Yes! Easter is a season – not just a day.** The great 50 days of Easter, including 8 Sundays, is a period of renewal. Technically, the word Easter has no Christian meaning; it comes from roots of springtime and fertility. Other languages preserve the root 'pasch' for Easter, meaning Christ as our Passover.

The number 50 is symbolic because of the Biblical concept of the year of Jubilee, a celebration when all debts were to be forgiven, all slaves liberated, and everyone would start over again in joy – **in joy!** Also, 49 days is a week of weeks (7x7), where 7 indicated fullness or completeness. Hence, 50 days finishes off a week of weeks with a sign of newness and rejoicing – **rejoicing!**

**Easter is a joyful season,** and traditionally through the centuries, no kneeling or fasting was allowed during Easter. The readings throughout the season are from the Book of Acts, allowing us to see the creation and life of the early church as an immediate response to Jesus' death and resurrection. During the Easter season, new converts reflected on the importance of their new faith. More mature Christians reviewed the basics of their faith and looked for deeper meaning. Therefore, the season is about discovery and reconsideration, a time for everyone to reaffirm their faith – **in joy rejoicing! Easter-luia!** (*Background information is from Laurence Hull Stookey*)

As we go through this Easter season, think about the children's message that I gave on Easter morning. Think about the wonder and the amazement of the children as I tore apart one of the pots of Easter tulips so that they – that we – could see that "in the bulb there is a flower." Are you singing that old, old hymn as you read this? The Easter season is a time of seeing the surprises and new life housed in many ordinary things around us, including in our own spirits and souls. May each of us experience a personal renewal of our faith during this joyous season. May we bloom and grow in much the same way all of God's good creation around us is blooming and growing. **And I don't want to see one gloomy face when I return! Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!**

## FAMILY PROMISE/IHN By Marilyn McAfee

***HE is Risen...Indeed!*** We know this and families currently struggling to make ends meet know this. Fairgreen packed 9 beautiful Easter baskets for former IHN families who are now in housing but still struggle to make their dollars last month to month. Some families were able to pick up their baskets and all expressed heartfelt thanks and gratitude for Fairgreen's help. One mom wasn't sure what her family would eat that evening until picking up her basket. This was an emotional moment. We assisted a mom with 5 children and an IHN Coordinator and daughter with food while mom prayed that her teaching job in a private school would not be terminated. (She just learned that she has a job for another year.) These are truly difficult times.

The good news is that we have new Host Congregations. Collingwood United Methodist originally agreed to try 2 hosting weeks this year. During the first week, they were having such a good time that they called and asked for a third week. They didn't want to wait until fall! New Kingdom Baptist Church is another new Host Congregation who will host twice this year and The University Church will become a supporting community for other congregations. Sometime soon, St. Patrick's of Heatherdowns will host two weeks this year. We have two "firsts" in 2009: our first Baptist and first Catholic congregations to join Family Promise/IHN.

More than 75 people attended the March 15 fundraiser at The Pinnacle. Rita (a former IHN guest) shared her story and talked about what IHN has meant to her. Just one year ago Rita and her children were homeless. She felt helpless and hopeless – finding herself searching through the yellow pages for assistance. This is where she found Family Promise/IHN. It took quite a while for her to get up the courage to come to IHN as Rita was afraid and didn't know what to expect from a shelter. Fortunately, what she encountered with IHN was dignity and compassion. Today, they live in their own home and Rita is a full time student at Davis College. She feels so passionately about her experience, that she regularly speaks to church congregations and other groups about her experiences, in the hopes that more people will get involved and support Family Promise.

To date, we have had 9 families – 27 people - 11 adults (one 2-parent family and one family included grandma) and 16 children. Thursday, April 23 we will host families at Hampton Park Christian Church and during the week of May 31 we will serve at Pilgrim Church. After May, we will host the week of June 14 at Hampton Park and then at Pilgrim the week of August 2.

Remember, children are counting on us! ***You do make a difference***





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## CONGREGATIONAL STEWARDSHIP By Pat Gibson

The Fairgreen Session has been reading and talking about an article, written by William Paul, titled "11 Principles for Congregational Stewardship." He described stewardship as "a many-sided multi-dimensional discipline" in this [Presbyterian Outlook](#) article of October 2, 2006.

The large bulletin board, in the educational wing hallway, near the Commons, will grow and become fuller as these principles, and the gifts that they can bring forward, are placed on it. Each copy of the [Leaves](#) from now through November, will include short articles, written by the elders, as to what a particular principle means to them. Be thinking, as you read, what it means to you!

One of the examples of stewardship, found in the Bible, announces that everything we are and have belongs to God. This is based on Psalm 24:1 which tells us, "The earth is the Lord' and all that is in it." Chuck and I have been blessed by being able to travel to many places. I am becoming increasingly aware, first hand, of intentionally taking care of our good earth and the air around it. The country of Costa Rica is extremely eco-friendly with 60% of their land preserved and cared for, environmentally. I was very troubled by traveling on the Volga River waterway in Russia and witnessing how powerplants/dams that were built in Stalin's time, have caused the flooded land to suffer, environmentally, for a variety of reasons. Our country has its own environmental struggles but also strong programs of awareness. Recycling is a very import one.

God, indeed, created this world of ours. Too much of the time too many of us think we can glean the wealth of minerals from beneath the surface, the bounty of animal and food from the land, the catch from the sea because it "just happened" to be there! Not so! Our gracious God entrusted all these good things to us to enjoy, to take care of, to respect, to use...not to poison, to deplete and to never look back. I feel that Psalm 24:1 is telling us that God owns the world which then places us, the people, as its manager, its caregiver, its steward.

## WHAT THIS PARTICULAR PRINCIPLE MEANS TO ME By Kay Amendola

**Philippians 2:5 ~ "Have this mind among yourselves, which you have in Christ Jesus."**

When I read this passage volunteering came to my mind. Volunteering is part of stewardship. Volunteer jobs can be big or small, time consuming or quick. They can be difficult or easy. Whatever. Often I wonder if I can do it? Can I be a productive member of the group? Am I too old? Can I fit it into my day? This passage helps to bring these questions into prospective.

Christ did all that was expected of him. What a role model! I think about Christ, as he came out of the wilderness after forty days to begin his ministry without a college education or a fancy resume. Christ began his ministry armed with the knowledge that God was always there beside him to help him. How can I be more like Christ?

In reflection, I think of the jobs I've done. I've tried to keep in mind that I was God's servant. That took a lot of the pressure off. God has always helped me find time available to complete a job and helped me so I didn't have to do it all by myself. God has a great team of people who are always there to help and they have a variety of great ideas and experiences from which to draw. After the job was done I've felt as though I had learned something and I have felt good inside too. Has this happened to you?

**Luke 9:24 ~ "For whoever would save his life will lose it; and whoever loses his life for my sake, he will save it."**

Tithing comes to mind when I read this passage. We live in a world of savings and retirement accounts. We buy insurance. We try to be watchful of money. We try to be responsible. Yet, Christ did not have a savings or a retirement account, whatever. Nor did he ever lack for what he needed. Can we step out of our bodies and leave our earthly cares by the wayside? Can we have the same faith that Christ had?

It's really all about **FAITH!** Letting go. That can be really scary!

Remember watching a baby learn to walk taking baby steps. Maybe we need to take baby steps. Children soon learn to jump, hop, run and even turn cartwheels. No concern on their part. Do you think we can also learn to have faith when tithing by taking baby steps and gradually learning to give more? Can you imagine the fun?



